YOU MAY BE ENTITLED TO SEVERANCE PAY!

Have you worked at the same studio for one or more years for at least 200 days per year? Were you recently laid off when your long-running television series came to an end? If you meet certain requirements, you might be eligible for severance pay.

You will need to know information such as: your lay-off date, your start date, how many days you worked, have you been called for work since your lay-off date.

Call Local 44, ask for Ed Brown, Paul Ahrens, Carl Hicks, or Anthony Pawluc. We will walk you through it.

If you want to look it up in our contract, it's "Paragraph 74 Severance Pay". You may access the Basic Agreement contract on-line at www.local44.com. Or, you can pick up a copy of our contract book at the Local.

SETTLEMENT REACHED BETWEEN RON CUNNINGHAM & LOCAL 44

All Local 44 members are well aware of the charges that were preferred against Business Agent Ronnie Cunningham. The Executive Board and Brother Cunningham announce that all issues based on the internal union charges have been resolved and settled, and the trial scheduled for May 6 and 7 was called off.

The Executive Board, the Charging Parties and Brother Cunningham have resolved this matter on a basis they believe is in the best interest of Local 44.

In the interest of resolving this dispute, Brother Cunningham will now take leave of his office and return to civilian life as a member. "I am proud of my record as Business Agent at Local 44 and I look forward to many more years as a member," said Cunningham. "I want to thank all Local 44 members for the support they have given me over the years."

Last April I was at the IATSE-AMPTP Quarterlies (only the Producers could call something that happens once a year the Quarterlies, but I digress).

The Quarterlies are an opportunity for the International, the Hollywood Locals, and the Producers to meet and try to hash out the desired changes and differences of both sides.

Much of what occurs, especially in trying to negotiate alterations to the Basic Agreement and other contracts, is geared toward streamlining our triennial negotiations.

One significant presentation is of the current and projected state of our medical and pension plans.

This gives a cursory insight into the health of our Plans, just how much it costs to maintain them and, on occasion, why some of the decisions and changes are made.

One thing I noted, because of the outcry about our presently ratified contract, was that in 2006 there was an increase in pension benefits to Retirees. Why? In our previous 3-year contract there was to be an increase if in the 3rd year of the contract (2006) provided there was an 8-month reserve in the medical plans, just like our new contract. There was, and the increase kicked in.

Our pension plans are healthy. The additional increase into the pension plans will kick in nearly \$10 million, and that's with modest estimates of the number of hours IATSE members will work. In 2005, 76

million hours were reported to the Plans; in 2006 the Plans project 71 million hours, less than last year, but more than the average of 2002-2004.

The IAP (Individual Account *Plan*), the personal retirement plan for each of us, will increase to 6% of your wages earned by the end of this contract. This belongs to you alone, and is based solely on what you do in your career. For those who are new to the Industry; this Plan didn't exist until the mid-1990s when the International negotiated it. Now we're up to 6%! In my opinion, from a financial standpoint, this is one of the most under-rated accomplishments of the International and the Hollywood Locals. This doesn't exist in the outside world.

Our medical plan, here is the bane of the financial stability of our Plans, and the crux of all the negotiated alterations.

Unless you've had your head in the sand, or you're in your 20s and don't worry about medical; you are well aware of the medical increases in our country. The annual medical increase in the country currently is around 13%.

Our country and our Industry are aging. In our Plans, the average age of workers has increased each year, and over the next decade it will increase at a greater rate. An older population requires more care.

Unlike retirement plans, where you can estimate your annual income, the number of participants, and the anticipated payouts, medical costs are frighteningly unpredictable in this day and age.

Because of this uncertainty, the Plans have to make this soothsayer dance, making their projections on "best guess" estimates. To date they've been successful.

At this moment, the Plans pay out about \$8 million for Retiree medical and \$30 million for Active member's health costs. That's monthly!

Currently there are 15 months reserves in the Actives and 20 months reserves in the Retiree medical plans. One move was to shift 4 months of Retiree medical into the Actives, giving each group approximately 16 months. A month's reserve is equal to the cost to cover a month's medical cost if NO contributions are made to Plans (for instance, if there was a strike and no work).

How can you help ensure the health of our Health Plans? Use the free medical available. What free medical? We've spoken of it before. It's called the Network. Right now the Plans have 5 fixed facilities. When you use these as your primary service provider of your medical, your co-pays are waived. Not only that, but if you go to these first and they refer you to someone outside the system; you are now considered to still be in the network. You may find that your current doctor is one on the referral list! Right now, the use of the Network is between 20% and 40%.

If this increased, it would accomplish two things; it would save money for the Plans and the member; and it would allow less need for negotiated changes, giving the International and the Hollywood Locals greater bargaining power for other things.

Use the "free" medical available, it helps all of us.



Dear Brothers and Sisters,

I am pleased to say that we came to a settlement with Mr. Cunningham that we feel is best for the local and best for Mr. Cunningham. And now hopefully we can start to focus most of our attention on the membership and their needs. I wish Ronnie all the best on his future with his family and retirement. I know many members feel he has done some wonderful things for the membership and I personally have to agree. But there are also those who think he's done much harm, and so we must leave it at that.

I would like to end by saying to the membership: please get more actively involved with your local. It's very important for us to know what you would like from your local. If you don't let us know, you're leaving it up to us to make the decisions and you might not like the decisions we make. I would like to ask you to just come to one or two of your craft meetings a year or a general membership meeting, so that we could have a quorum or two. It's all about solidarity, and we don't have much of that if you choose not to get involved. Let's start looking to the future so we don't lose more of the benefits that our brothers and sisters before us fought so hard for. Plus, it's a good opportunity to learn more about your officers that represent you. I've had several members tell me that they thought I was a paid fulltime employee of the local, which is not true. I'm part of the general workforce out there with the general population.

I, and the rest of your Executive Board members, receive a fifty dollar stipend per Executive Board meeting and the rest of the service to the Local is done on a volunteer basis. It has been a tough but incredible journey thus far, and I hope to continue to serve with great discipline and commitment to all

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

For the past month or so I have seen and experienced the gutwrenching upset that has been this episode regarding the charges against Brother Cunningham. There has been an agreement reached, affirmed by the Executive Board, with the advice of legal counsel, in order to keep the Local and the membership from being subjected to outrageous expenses that would be involved were these charges played out through our internal justice system as laid out in the Constitution and Bylaws of Local 44 and the International.

Let there be no misunderstanding: the charges were all made in good faith. Cognizance over the charges was taken by the Executive Board with the hope of airing the charges in a proper and legal forum and in the manner that our internal conflicts have always been handled; i.e., in a full and fair hearing before the Executive Board. When, instead the charged party opted for a trial by the membership, it became evident that there were monumental logistical and other problems that made the process incredibly difficult to surmount. To my knowledge there has never been such a membership hearing within IATSE that involved a local consisting of a membership in excess of five thousand members. A venue had to be chosen and a way of keeping the voting on the various charges fair for the accused as well as the charging parties. The expenses for what could have been a two-day hearing were well into the six figures. The charged party was suggesting that the hearing could take as long as five weekends before it was completed. Although a fullblown hearing was the only way to truly bring all the evidence, from both sides, out into the open, the expense to accomplish that was tremendous, and imposing that expense on the Local would have been irresponsible.

It has been suggested that we call Craft Meetings as soon as possible to attempt to answer questions regarding this whole episode. I hope to have these meetings scheduled as soon as possible so that we can advise you of what was in the settlement between the Local and Brother Cunningham.

As for the personnel at our offices, in the organizational construct that is determined by our Constitution and the procedures set down by the Executive Board, the Business Agent hires for the Local those people under his aegis; his assistants, and the Secretary/Treasurer hires for the local, the Call Board and Business



office personnel. By virtue of their positions they also can relieve people of their positions at their will. The Executive Board has the responsibility to approve these personnel choices and to step in when things are done in a manner that is fiscally irresponsible or cosmetically unsound. In order for the two primary officers of this labor union to control and operate their offices they must have that leeway.

It is now time for us to go forward with this Local and make sure that all members are treated in a fair and equitable manner. It is important that we explore avenues of employment for our membership within our jurisdiction as well as areas where currently no jurisdiction exists. With new technologies, new opportunities are opening up, we need to keep abreast of them to ensure that our brother and sister members are not displaced or lose out on potential new opportunities. For the sake of this Local and its members we must not dwell on the past. Today is but the opening of a new chapter in the history of this great Local. Let's get to it.

PREDESIGNATING A DOCTOR FOR WORKER'S COMP INJURIES Take control of your own treatment, predesignate.

Most of us never think about who is going to treat us if we get hurt on the job. Recent changes in the Worker's Comp laws have made it critical to notify your employer, in writing, of who you want to treat you in the event of a workplace injury.

If you predesignate: You will be allowed to see your personal physician right after you are injured. You may switch doctors later, if necessary. The doctor that you predesignate must have treated you in the past and have your medical record. The doctor must be your Primary Care Physician and must agree to be predesignated. It may also be useful to predesignate the doctor's Medical Group.

If you don't predesignate: Your employer usually will have the right to choose the doctor who treats you for at least the first 30 days after your employer learns about your injury or illness. You can end up with a doctor who works for the employer or the employer's insurance company and may not have your best interest in mind

Keep Work Union: Utilize Signatory Shops

We all want to put the best effort and product forward to create the finished look the production desires on any feature, television program, commercial or music video. At the same time, we endeavor to get the most competitive prices we can find. However, we can not sacrifice bargaining unit work performed by qualified union members to outside vendors that are not signatories to the IA and Local 44.

When your department requires drapery work, a special prop, certain set dressing or glass work, you can go to our Local 44 website (www.local44.com) and review our signator companies and/or give us a call at the hall and speak with a Business Agent who can point you in the right direction of Local 44 signatory companies.

This helps keep members working under a contract, it protects key personnel from possible contract violations and offers the production quality and professionalism.

Local 44 Does Not Send Bills

Recently, some members have registered concerns about not receiving bills to remind them of their upcoming dues payments. Local 44 does not now, nor has it ever sent bills.

According to the Constitution and By-Laws: Article Three, Sec. 1 "Members must keep themselves advised of the status of their account, and this Local is not required to send any notice whatsoever of Dues or other indebtedness."

Dues are due *quarterly*, which means they are due once every three months beginning January 1. These dates are January 1, April 1, July 1 and October 1. This has been the schedule since Local 44 was chartered. Each member was notified of the payment schedule when he or she joined the union; the dues dates appear in every issue of the Newsreel and are posted on our website, www.local44.org; and a revised dues schedule is sent annually at year-end to advise members of

upcoming changes or increases.

Dues must be received in the office on or before the FIRST DAY of the quarter, regardless of your work status. (Dues are processed by the date they are received, not by the date written on the check.) There is a seven day grace period; however, after the seventh day, day fines will be charged retroactively to the first day of the quarter. Day fines are currently \$1.80 per day for every day a member is working in a quarter for which he or she has not paid.

If dues are unpaid for a full quarter, you become suspended,

and a reinstatement fee of \$180 will be assessed. For example, if you do not pay your dues for first quarter, you are suspended and assessed a reinstatement fee on April 1st (the first day of second quarter). Additionally, you owe day fines for every day you worked in both quarters. If dues continue to be unpaid for an additional quarter, you become dropped. You then not only owe back dues, the reinstatement fee and day fines; but if you are working, a three-day letter will be written to your employer. Dropped and suspended members are not eligible to work.

If you are having difficulties making payments due to unemployment, disability or other circumstances, please call the hall. We are happy to work with you and explain available options. However, we cannot help you if we are not aware of your situation; and the further you drop into arrears, the more difficult it becomes to get back into good standing.

As a courtesy, the Secretary-Treasurer's office recently began sending mid-quarter reminders to members who have not yet paid and are in danger of becoming suspended or dropped. Notification is also sent to members when they become suspended or dropped. Because these letters are automatically generated, the system is not without fault. Payments are sometimes received just after the letters are sent out. If you receive a mid-quarter

reminder or suspended/dropped letter, but have already made your payment, please call the hall to double-check that payment was received. These reminders are not sent as a reprimand. Rather, they are sent to help you maintain your good standing.

ATTENTION RETIREES

The Motion Picture & Television Fund has launched a collaborative effort with Rebuilding Together. This effort allows the Fund to coordinate volunteers to modify and repair homes of our Industry elderly homeowners, particularly those with limited resources. We are looking for homeowners who feel they need renovations to make their homes safe and are unable to pay for these renovations. **Examples of home modifications** include installation of grab bars, widening doorways for wheelchairs, lowering door thresholds for ease with walkers and wheelchairs, and building wheelchair ramps. No One Thinks it Can Happen to Them

My name is Jan K. Bergstrom; I'm a Local 44 Set Decorator (#5505)/, and I'm writing you to ask for some much needed help from the Local 44 Benevolent Fund.

Due to a Workers' Compensation claim, I have been unable to work since August of 2002. I was doing reshoots on THE RING, when I fell down, tripping over a stair/plynth added to the location, a cabin on Lake Malibu – we were 16 hours into an 18 hour day. We drove home, had 1 ½ hours of sleep and were back to open the set.

I notified Production about my fall and they had me fill out the standard form. Previously, I had two neck fusion surgeries and a lumbar lamenectomy. Those 3 surgeries while work related, were done via MPIPHP, as I had been warned that a Workers' Comp claim would end my career and ruin my life. This time, because I had filled out production's report, I did not have an option.

After the fall, I required a multiple lumbar fusion. Workers' Comp paid me weekly for a while; they then cut me off, claiming they were not liable. Unfortunately, while they didn't approve my surgery, they also refused to "deny" it. For this reason, MPIPHP would not pay. In the meantime, I was in terrible plain, on heavy pain medication and without an income. After waiting for two years with no change in my condition and my finances exhausted, I was forced to sell my townhouse and move back to my hometown of Rockford, Illinois in May of 2004.

A good portion of my home sale went to repaying friends who had loaned me money, and to pay off charge cards I used for daily and medical/insurance expenses. A month before my COBRA ran out in June of 2005, MPIPHP agreed to pay for the surgery and put a lien against Workers' Comp. I came back to LA for the surgery and am now recovering in Illinois. According to my doctors, I will never again be able to work as a Set Decorator. I am still on very heavy pain management. It has now been over three and half years since I've been able to work and earn an income

My first Social Security Disability application was denied (unbelievable, but I hear that is standard operating procedure). According to my Social Security attorney, it will probably be a year before my appeal will be approved.

This month I had to file bankruptcy and am down to money for one last mortgage payment. I'm now eligible for \$150.99 of food stamps a month and some financial aid with my medical expenses. I'm now being forced to choose between food and some of my medications.

Rhonda Bragdon in your office has been incredibly helpful to me, recently assisting me in obtaining Honorable Withdrawal status. She is incredibly compassionate and a huge asset to Local 44. She recently gave me other places to try and get help from.

As embarrassing as it is going from being a successful feature film Set Decorator, to food stamps, I'm writing to see if there is any way I can get some help from Local 44 Benevolent Fund. I know 44 is having problems of their own, but I'm desperately trying to hang on until my SS is approved and I can get my MPIPHP benefits back. Any amount

would help.

I also hope my story could be used as a cautionary tale for other Local 44 members. Workers' Comp is not there to help us. Be careful about what you sign. Thanks for listening and I hope to hear from you. Sincerely, Jan K. Bergstrom

TIME again for a new TV season TIME to renegotiate Deal Memos

I hope to bring awareness to the members in what their future will hold. As a department head or specialized craftsperson, you use various tools to perform your job, and must request specific rates of compensation for these items. Most of the rates of compensation for equipment rentals like box, car, cell phone, etc. have been stagnant or declining over the past 20 years. With the digital age moving in, we are more often using computers, cameras and printers. These items are not negotiated in the Basic Agreement, rather they are left for all of us to negotiate on our own.

I implore everyone to get involved. Remember, our Craft meetings are coming up! Hopefully, there will be a sign-up sheet for members interested in a workshop on BETTER TERMS AND CONDITIONS negotiating tactics.

In the meantime, if you are faced with negotiating rates or reimbursement amounts, check with others who have worked with the same production company or just survey a few people that work in the same field. We need to talk amongst ourselves and find out where gains are possible.

Comparing notes will help you strike a better deal. Remember, it never hurts to start high when negotiating so that both parties have somewhere to go. Most of all, DO YOUR HOMEWORK!

Each show is different and requires different needs, i.e. a larger Box Rental or better Vehicle Coverage (especially with booming gas prices).

Together we can help raise the compensation rates up to realistic levels.

There is much to discuss and achieve together. Let's use the Union and its resources for this dialogue.

If everyone stays informed and in touch with each other, there is no reason we can't raise the bar.

When I started as a Propmaster it was your job to get and take care of picture cars, trucks motorcycles, boats, animals, airplanes, helmets, gun belts, guns and anything an actor touched was your responsibility.

My truck was to keep all the props in place. It was like a general store. You had cigarettes, gum, candy and sodas. When a department needed something, they could normally find it on the prop truck.

When I started, these were all your job. If you need a tiein, you called the company, not the tie-in companies. Now if you think they hire you for your good looks and personality, see how many of them call you if you get rid of the chairs. You should be trying to get things back. Also, you want more money for your equipment. Well, to start with, you have given everything away. So why pay you anything at all.

A Propmaster used to have a lot of respect. Now you gave that away with everything else. You may not like this, but that's too bad. I don't have to worry about it any more because I'm retired. But you people should. So quit giving things away, including the chairs.

OPEN LETTER TO THE MEMBERS OF LOCAL 44 SENT MAY 11, 2006

Subject: Un-Earned Benefits

Brother President Short:

I have been informed by
I.A.T.S.E. Local 44 that part of the
settlement between Local 44
Executive Board and Ronald
"Ronnie" Cunningham Business
Agent included full wages and benefits through the end of 2006. From the
information I've received, I understand that was the formula used to
obtain the dollar amount for the settlement. While I personally do not agree
the issue should have been resolved
without the full Trial By Membership,

I will concur with the elected Officers of the Union that the matter is now closed.

I do however object to Mr. Cunningham receiving Benefits for un-worked and un-earned hours to be paid into the Motion Picture Industry Pension and Health Plans. Mr. Cunningham was removed from office and the settlement was reached between the parties on May 3, 2006, and therefore that should have been the last date benefits were paid into the Plans. From that date foreword everything except the cash negotiated should have stopped. That is also the date Mr. Cunningham officially resigned his position as Business Agent and had it posted on the Local 44 web site.

As of this date, many of the members have asked for a full disclosure of the settlement from the Local, but while the information has been promised - little has been forthcoming. Mr. Cunningham's original charges included overpayment of hours into the Motion Picture Plans during his previous terms in office. 1989 to 2001. Now our Executive Board has chosen to again pay into the Plans for hundreds of hours he will not be employed in the Motion Picture Industry. I urge you to start an investigation, and stop those un-worked benefit hours from being accepted by the Motion Picture Plans.

All members-in-good standing and those Retired after July 15, 1991 will get an increase to \$6,500.

Clarence Edward Burke Jr. "Jonnie"

Jonnie Burke, two time Emmy award winner, inducted into the Television Arts & Sciences Hall of Fame (LACMA), known as one of the top rated Special Effects men in Hollywood, and the mastermind behind the special effects for the hit TV series Mission Impossible passed away May 2, 2006 at the age of 85.

Jonnie was born in Pasadena, California on New Years Day. As a young boy he was given the title of "Most Beautiful Baby" which gave him a seat on the Rose Parade floats.

He graduated from Pasadena City College where he played football, and later taught electronics.

Jonnie was a WWII veteran having served his country in the Army. After being wounded and missing in action, he was awarded the Purple Heart.

He was a 40 year resident of La Canada with he wife "Libby", to whom he was married 55 years (she preceded Jonnie in death in 1997). There they raised their two children, Jon and Debbie Burke.

Jonnie's long and distinguished career included feature film credits on It's a Mad Mad Mad Mad World, Devil at 4 O'clock, King Rat, Herbie The Love Bug and Matt Helm movies. His television credits included The Red Skelton Show, Mannix and the most popular, Mission Impossible.

Jonnie passed away peacefully of natural causes with his family at his side in Pasadena, CA.

Jonnie was a beloved husband, father, grandfather, brother and friend. He is survived by his son Jon Burke(wife Dianne) of La Canada Flintridge, daughter Deborah Burke Haessig of Westlake Village and grand-children Stacey, Jon, Bhret, Breyden and Heather, his great grandchildren Christopher and Nicole, his sister Jayne, and his beloved sweetheart Lois, whom he shared his last 8 years with.

"Jersey" Jim Meyer passed away early in the morning on monday, April 17th. He had been battling liver cancer for a few months.

Jim was a Local 44 member for 19 years, and a Shop Steward at Fox for over 10 years. He was a wonderful friend and a valued, active member of Local 44.

He will be sorely missed.

AFL-CIO AIMS TO REBUILD THE CALIFORNIA DREAM

The 2006 California Labor Federation Legislative Conference was held in Sacramento, CA from April 30 – May 2, 2006, with me, Interim Assistant Business Agent Paul Ahrens, representing Local 44. Participating in this conference was important for IATSE Local 44 in developing and deepening our ties with other IATSE locals around the state, with the broader labor movement statewide, and with our elected representatives in Sacramento.

Sunday evening was the IATSE California delegation meeting. 15 IATSE members from around the state attended. Meeting was co-chaired by Michael Miller and Thom Davis, International Vice-Presidents, and by George Palazzo, International Trustee.

Art Pulaski, Executive Secretary-Treasurer of the California Labor Federation, gave a 15-minute overview of political trends in the state, and the urgent need for labor to get more involved in electing a prolabor candidate for governor in 2006.

Next was a discussion about Assembly Bill 777, the Fabian Nunez bill for stimulating film production in California.

Monday morning, May 1, was the opening plenary, with highlights being speeches by Richard Alarcon, Chair of the State Senate Labor and Industrial Relations Committee, and Paul Koretz, Chair of the State Assembly Labor and Employment Committee (both represent areas with large numbers of our members).

Next was a workshop on Legislative Priorities, which highlighted the specifics of Rebuilding the California Dream, including reform of Workers Compensation, raising and indexing the minimum wage, protecting the public's right to know, holding corporations accountable, and initiative reform.

Phil Angelides, California State Treasurer, gave an impassioned luncheon speech. The California Labor Federation has endorsed Angelides for Governor. In the afternoon were two sessions of workshops, with various choices available. I attended the workshops on changes in Workers Compensation and on Corporate Accountability.

The highlight of the dinner was presentation of awards to state legislators who voted 100% with Labor on important bills in 2005.

On Tuesday morning, the Los Angeles County Federation hosted a four and a half hour Lobby Session, held in a meeting room of State Assembly Speaker Fabian Nunez of Los Angeles. Two dozen of L.A. County's State Senators and Assembly members took turns describing their legislative priorities and hearing from over fifty labor representatives from many L.A. unions about our issues.

On Tuesday afternoon, I individually visited with various Senators and Assembly members, speaking either with them or with their labor staffer about Runaway Production and AB 777. Among the offices visited were those of Senate Majority Leader Gloria Romero, Speaker of the Assembly Fabian Nunez, and State Senator Gilbert Cedillo on the important Revenue and Taxation Committee.

EXECUTIVE BOARD MEETINGS HIGHLIGHTS

Many of our members have expressed an interest in the content of the monthly Executive Board meetings. Below is a summary of the most recent meetings. These are only brief highlights and do not contain great detail. They are meant to give an overview of things that were discussed, not a fully accurate account. Any member wishing to read the minutes of the Executive Board in their entirety, may do so by appointment though the Secretary-Treasurer's office.

Tues., March 28th, 2006 - Special Meeting

<u>Discussion:</u> Cunningham Impeachment Trial.

Decisions and scenarios were discussed about the trial of March 29, 2006.

Motion: If there were a continuance of the March 29th trial of Ron Cunningham that the weekend of May 6th and 7th be considered.

Motion passed.

The Secretary-Treasurer was instructed to prepare flyers for that possible announcement to the membership.

Wed., March 29th, 2006 - Special Meeting

<u>Committee</u>: The President formed a committee composed of Executive Board members to develop a lottery system for the upcoming trial by membership. The committee was to receive a stipend while conducting business.

Motion: To bring back into employment Tom McConville under the Secretary-Treasurer's direction with modified duties.

Motion passed with one abstention.

Motion: To relieve Mike Clark of his position as Assistant Business Agent by withdrawing the consent of the Board under Article 8; Section 6 of the Constitution.

<u>Discussion:</u> Surrounding the payment of severance to Mike Clark. The two sides were that he had received 30 days leave of absence pay and that he deserved compensation to look for employment.

The previous motion was restated. Motion passed.

Motion: To pay Mike Clark two weeks sever-

On a split vote, motion passed with one abstention.

Wed., April 5th, 2006 - Regular Meeting

Report: Trial Committee

The issues and areas of concern in conducting a trial by membership were addressed for the upcoming Cunningham Impeachment Trial.

Security for a large venue and parking supplied at union expense.

Registration and identification of membership;

trial packages to be supplied to all in attendance.

In the trial there would be video and audio recording along with a court reporting stenographer. If a juror left the building except at designated breaks, they would eliminate themselves from the jurists.

Meals and comfort breaks would be supplied. Box lunches with dinner provided if necessary.

Letter sent to International President Short regarding the groundwork the Local had done in preparation of the trial, in order to insure that all processes were legal according to the IA.

<u>Discussion:</u> The request by Local 44 to have a lottery system for trials by membership was denied by the International. Trial by membership means all members must have ability to attend.

Only members-in-good standing would be allowed to vote. Retired IA members could not vote

A shop steward meeting was held to explain the procedures and events in order to let the membership have another source of information.

Could the International consider a ruling of time limits on the presentation of evidence on each charge, similar to an outside jury where the prosecution and defense have set limits on time? This would allow the trial to finish conceivably in one day.

What if one side wished to try delaying tactics? The Chair would have to exercise their right to speed a decision, but it would have to be used sparingly and appropriately.

Motion: That Sergeant-At-Arms Gullickson is allowed voice on the Board concerning issues from the committee with which she was given responsibility.

Motion passed.

Report: Constitution Committee

Representative Ferry gave a report on the cover letter to be mailed to all members regarding the approved Article 9 revisions. The letter was to go out immediately after the conclusion of the Cunningham Impeachment trial.

Due to the problems with impeachment of an Officer and the rules to follow, it was suggested that the Article covering this would be the next area of interest.

Report: Secretary-Treasurer

A letter of clarification on trial issues that was sent to International President Short over the size of venues for a membership trial was read. It quoted Local 44's population size the average number of members at a general membership meeting the past several years.

President Short responded to the above letter saying adding several hundred members to an anticipated turnout should suffice. (The Board had questioned whether 4 times the quorum size would work). President Short concurred and said should it not be enough that the trial could be adjourned.

The Secretary-Treasurer handed out a sheet of over a dozen venues, which had responded to the request for the weekend in question for the trial. Several were not large enough, some were unavailable both days of the weekend, and others were

expensive, but there were enough locations to make the event plausible.

New initiations for 2006 were ahead of the budgeted number in the annual budget considerations (65 of the 150 estimate).

The Palm Springs "Quarterlies" were a couple weeks away. The International said that only those issues unresolved from the December negotiations would be added to the docket. As such only a couple Special Effects safety issues were yet decided.

The Secretary-Treasurer read an affidavit charges to the Board.

Affidavit: One member of the Local was charging an Executive Board Officer and an additional member of the Local with filing false and malicious charges against him, stemming from language found in the Cunningham Impeachment affidavits.

The Executive Board member in question removed themselves from the room.

Motion: To take cognizance of the charges as read.

Motion passed.

The Secretary-Treasurer read a second affidavit charges to the Board.

Affidavit: One member of the Local was charging an Officer with aiding in a recent initiate with receiving preferential hiring. Three other members had penalties attached to them.

The Officer in question removed themselves from the room.

<u>Discussion:</u> As this was an Officer charged with impeachable offenses was a suspension necessary?

The Board went into Executive Session for 22 minutes.

<u>Discussion:</u> The affidavit did not mention two members in the initial body of charges, but later added their names in the penalty portion. The affidavit was not properly written.

Motion: To <u>not</u> take cognizance of the charges based on improper format.

Motion passed.

The investment portfolio of the Local just surpassed the \$3 million mark. That is over a \$1 million added to the investments in 15 months.

Benevolent Request: Dorree Cooper

Sister Cooper was a 44 member that was a victim of Hurricane Katrina. She was out of funds and needed assistance.

Motion: To donate \$1500 and place a charitable request to the members in the Newsreel.

Motion passed.

The Secretary-Treasurer read a letter from International President Short from ex-Business Agent Stewart McGuire regarding his two recent decisions of trial; one on severance; one on improper use of union funds to a charity event. President Short said one was untimely and one he hadn't enough information to overrule on cognoscibility.

A recent ad in the SDSA magazine that was developed by the new webmaster at Local 44 was presented to the Board.

Report: Business Agent

Interim B.A. Brown reported on a shop steward's meeting revolving around the Cunningham

Impeachment trial and what they could legally say when asked questions by the membership.

Alternative Metal Supply has officially become a signator company.

The Interim Assistant B.A.s were again attending the International Organizing Committee.

There was success in overturning a non-payment of severance to a Warner Bros. Employee. Also there was an overturning of non-payment of meal penalties.

The Board went into Executive Session for 9 minutes.

Presentation: 301a Filing

Brother Livolsi and a group of other non-members presented their appeal to release funds to the 301a filing that 44 members had requested. The presenters stated that after the initial payment was given to the legal group, any additional funds would be conditional on matching funds.

The Board requested the status of the CEIDR report; this was a data report on the extent of production being done outside the United States.

A request was made to have safeguards put in place to when releasing funds to the legal firm, to insure that the member's money was not squandered

Questions were raised surrounding any previous directives coming out of the 2001 IATSE Convention in Chicago from the International on tax subsidies. Did the 301a violate that mandate? It was believed not.

Motion: To give the first installment payment set aside for the 301a filing.

Motion passed with one abstention.

The Board went into Executive Session for 25 minutes.

There had been damage reported to one Board member's car during a recent Board meeting.

Motion: To approve \$1500 for repair to the hood of the Board member's car.

Motion passed.

A list of members who had not been properly informed by past administration on how to retire had died. This Board had set aside funds to pay for them. Names would be emailed to the Board for approval of funds to be released.

Motion: To email the names of recently deceased members and the circumstances under which they should receive set aside funds for their death benefits. A polling of the Board will occur for said fund release.

Motion passed.

<u>Tues., April 18, 2006 – Regular Meeting</u>

Report: Trial Committee

A progress report was given on the Cunningham Impeachment proceedings. There was a tentative deal to secure a soundstage at CBS Radford Studios.

The Local's legal counsel had approached the International with questions regarding procedures for the upcoming trial.

The Board entered into Executive Session for 1 hour 33 minutes.

Motion: To send a copy of the Trial Committee's report to the International and to the Cunningham defense counsel. Motion passed.

Report: Business Agent

The AMPTP/IATSE Cooperative would begin tomorrow. The two Special Effects issues would be on the agenda; diving with a partner and diving in unclean waters.

Interim Assistant B.A. Ahrens reported that the Industry Safety Committee formed a sub-committee on radio frequency interference with explosives. Representative Streett had previously reported on this issue and volunteered to give his expertise.

The Cal State Labor Fed was meeting in Sacramento on May 1st and it was requested that interim Asst. B.A. Ahrens attend, as he was already a L.A. County Fed delegate.

Unattended grievances were being caught up and settled, though there was a significant backlog.

The Board went into Executive Session for 5 minutes.

Report: Secretary-Treasurer

A planned Retiree event that had been scheduled prior to the trial of Cunningham was going forward. Notifications went to all qualified Retirees. Many Retiree respondents never realized the Local had these events and were glad for the opportunity.

The Secretary-Treasurer read two affidavits of charges to the Board.

Affidavit One: One member of the Local was charging an Officer with aiding in a recent initiate with receiving preferential hiring.

Affidavit Two: One member of the Local was charging an Officer with dispatching non-members to work improperly.

The Officer removed himself from the room.

The Board entered into Executive Session.

Motion: To take cognizance on the first set of charges

Motion passed.

Motion: To <u>not</u> take cognizance of the second set of charges as they were not specific enough or written properly.

Motion passed.

The Board entered into Executive Session for 10 minutes.

Second Reading of Charges: The Secretary-Treasurer made the second reading of charges into the record of one member of the Local charging an Executive Board Officer and an additional member of the Local with filing false and malicious charges against him, stemming from language found in the Cunningham Impeachment affidavits.

Secretary-Treasurer would set a date for trial after consulting calendar considerations.

<u>Discussion:</u> Functioning of new phone system. It was noted that there were still components of the advanced phone system still left undone, however the system was saving the Local over \$400 in monthly bills.

The Board entered into Executive Session for 6 minutes. <u>Discussion:</u> Potential lawsuits revolving around Cunningham Impeachment trial.

<u>Tues. Apr. 26, 2006- Special Meeting – Trial Negotiations</u>

The Board entered into Executive Session for 1 hour.

<u>Presentation:</u> Sebastian Milito Statement
Coordinator Milito made a statement calling
for a settlement of the Cunningham Impeachment
issues by the Board on behalf of the membership,
stating those he'd heard from were wishing the situation was finished. He was concerned about the distraction and the expense.

<u>Presentation:</u> Robert Blackburn Statement Coordinator Blackburn appealed to the Board in a similar manner as Brother Milito, saying to settle on behalf of the membership and allow this issue to be resolved without the expense.

<u>Discussion:</u> Settlement Agreement and Release

The Board went into Executive Session for 40 minutes.

The Board discussed the Agreement Cunningham legal counsel and Local 44's legal counsel had hashed out.

Motion: To accept the Agreement prepared presented by counsel.

There was discussion on some grammatical errors and dates.

The Board went into Executive Session for 10 minutes.

The previous motion was restated.

By secret ballot; the motion passed 10 to 5 with one abstention.

<u>Statement:</u> Representative Raiche stated that incumbent upon the signing of the agreement and release he would leave the Board.

Report: Trial Committee

As there was no definite end to the Cunningham Impeachment trial until Cunningham signed the document and had a legally required 7-day reconsidering period, the Committee had to continue to operate as though the trial was continuing.

The Committee presented its financial impact report on holding a two-day trial. Costs would already exceed \$220,000, and a couple costs had not yet been factored in.

Motion: To send written report and copies to the International and the defense counsel of Cunningham.

Motion passed.

Wed., May 3, 2006 - Regular Meeting

Motion: To go out of order of the agenda and bring issues surrounding Cunningham

Impeachment trial to the top. Motion passed.

The Board went into Executive Session for 22 minutes.

<u>Discussion:</u> Surrounding the wording of the mutually agreed upon press release of Local 44 and Cunningham (a requirement of the settlement agreement)

Motion: That Local 44's counsel returns to Cunningham's legal team and request 4 proposed changes to the wording in the press release. Motion passed.

Reading into the Record: Cunningham's Proposed Statement

The original press release of Brother Cunningham was read into the record.

Reading into the Record: Raiche Statement

A letter from Representative Raiche was read into the record regarding his absence from the Board that evening and expressing his views on the settlement of the Cunningham Impeachment trial.

Report: Trial Committee

The final report was presented with a contingency plan if the settlement agreement failed.

The committee requested it be given one additional meeting to correlate and compose its findings in order to have a document available on how future trial by memberships could be conducted.

Report: Business Agent

Agreements were reached with the AMPTP at the "Quarterlies" in Palm Springs over the Special Effects safety issues.

A meeting was held with the Director of the Art Directors Guild regarding opening dialogue with Set Decorators and Production Designers.

A request was being made to have people from the Plans available at the Craft meetings in June to discuss the changes occurring August 1.

Interim Assistant B.A. Ahrens gave his report on the recent Cal-Fed Conference in Sacramento.

The Board entered into Executive Session for 5 minutes.

A letter was handed out from a Sister in San Francisco

The Board entered into Executive Session for 3 minutes.

15 more grievances had been settled. A letter was read from Brother Dave Roesch's wife.

A letter was read from Sister Jan Bergstrom regarding her financial plight

Motion: A financial assistance of \$2,500 to Sister Bergstrom.

Motion passed.

Report: Secretary-Treasurer

A handout was presented updating the Board on new members.

Second Reading of Charges: Mike Clark of the Local was charging Secretary-Treasurer Elliot Jennings with aiding a recent initiate with receiving preferential hiring.

<u>Discussion:</u> As the Cunningham trial had been settled, wouldn't these charges stemming from that also be settled? Legal counsel advised that each of the Charging Parties would have to agree to drop their charges. The Secretary-Treasurer said he would not accept withdraw on his charges.

Motion: That both upcoming trials be set for May 17th.

Motion passed with one abstention.

The Secretary-Treasurer reported on the progress of the annual Picnic. A deposit had already been given Calamigos Ranch and a date of Sunday October 15th set. Locals 80, 728, and 729 had renewed interest in participating.

A handout from the financial group was given to the Board.

The annual fee for the membership to the SDSA was due.

Motion: To approve \$2,000 annual fee. Motion passed.

A letter from International President Short was read asking to respond to a letter he received from ex-Secretary-Treasurer Walter Keske. The letter asked President Short to retract his fine on the grievance trial he had been involved in, and also complained of his suspension as a result of his non-payment.

<u>Discussion:</u> What were the boundaries for discussing the Settlement Agreement with Cunningham?

Downey Studios Issue:

The Board entered into Executive Session for 17 minutes.

Report: Diversity Report from T.V. Academy

A handout of a proposed directory from the TV Academy was presented.

The report targeted individuals by race, nationality, gender and sexual preference. It encouraged hiring because of these attributes. There was a 50% bonus offered for hiring using the Diversity Program.

It was noted that this directly circumvented the use of the Call Board.

Wed., May 17, 2006 - Double Trial

TRIAL

Greg Hamlin vs. Craig Raiche and Daniel Graham

(this matter involved alleged wrongful statements in a Cunningham Impeachment Affidavit)

The day prior to this trial International President Short faxed a letter to Local 44 stating that he had read the affidavit of charges and found that the Executive Board should not have taken cognizance of the charges as the Charging Parties claims were not subject to internal union remedies.

By order of the International these charges were dismissed.

TRIAL

Michael Clark vs. Elliot Jennings

(this matter involved alleged illegal hiring practices)

The Charging Party was found to have presented no evidence to support his allegations.

All charges were dropped in their entirety.

The Trial Board then determined whether Clark had brought these false charges with malice and should be assessed a fine according to the International Constitution (Article 16; Section 4). The Trial Board voted by secret ballot.

<u>Filing false charges *with malice*</u>: International CBL; Article 16; Section 4;

Guilty (vote 10 to 2)

The penalty is as follows:

An automatic fine of \$500 levied against the Charging Party effective immediately.
