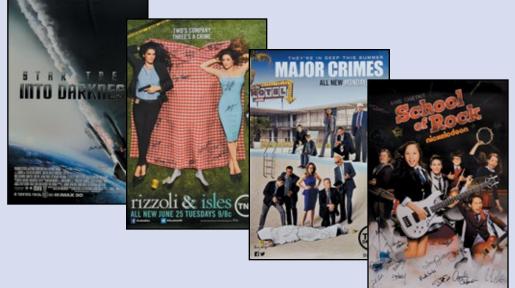

Take a Look Inside the dahlhouse

fter receiving a degree from San Francisco State University in Industrial Design, Erik Dahl became "intrigued with propmaking". He then returned to Los Angeles and found that many of his friends were in the film industry. At the time Erik was working as a contractor doing home remodeling until someone mentioned to him that his "skill set was well suited for the scenery construction field". This prompted Erik to begin leading and coordinating jobs in the film industry. Erik states that, "along with some up and coming production designers, I took some chances and bid on some large music video sets, and took off from there".

Once Erik got his feet wet in the film industry he realized that there was a need for space to build in. Erik started Dahlhouse Scenery in 1997 in Echo Park after

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building numerous sets directly on the stage for previous jobs and realizing that if he opened a shop he could have designers and production companies come to him. Erik first opened Dahlhouse

Scenery with the main focus on music videos and photo shoots but explains that, "as Dahlhouse Scenery and our clientele became more established, we progressed together to concentrate primarily on commercials which have been our staple for the last 15 years". Dahlhouse originally started as a live/work loft space for Erik. He shares with us that, "the crew would start building in the morning as me and my 5-year old son would eat our breakfast behind a hinged Plexiglas wall in the full view of workers. When breakfast was over, we'd swing the wall into the kitchen and transform it into a building space". As business evolved and demands progressed, the shop relocated to Downtown

L.A. where they had more space to work with. The space allowed them to grow and expand their client base and services they are able to provide today. Erik states that, "the fact that Downtown has



become "L.A.'s back lot" has also worked out as a major convenience factor".

Dahlhouse scenery produces an array of projects on a day-to-day basis. The Dahlhouse crew does scenery construction and painting for various commercials, television, film, and still photo shoots in their shop, while also offering set design services to their clients. Erik lets us in on some of his most memorable moments with Dahlhouse to date. Super bowl commercials come up at the top of the list for favorite sets to build and they "have become a benchmark for shops and designers that specialize in commercials". Dahlhouse Scenery



did the notable "Magic Fridge" Bud Light commercial in 2006 and was one of the top ads, Erik says that "everyone who saw the actual set remembers it to this day". Dahl goes on to say that Dahlhouse's "ultimate achievement came in 2015" when they built sets for 9 commercials that ran during the Super Bowl that year. "These included Mercedes Benz, Budweiser, Hyundai, Mountain Dew, Toyota, Esurance, and Carl's Jr". Erik says that "everyone involved in these jobs – from the laborers to the production designers, enjoyed watching the game and being able to say "we built that set!" again and again". Erik and his crew take pride

in the sets they build and hard

work they put in everyday all while enjoying the ability to contribute their masterpieces to the entertainment industry. In February of this year, Erik and his crew were excited to announce that they became an I.A.T.S.E. signatory shop. With this new development, they are "finding new avenues of work in T.V. pilots, feature films, and live television". Erik explains that, "the first week of Union payroll was a huge milestone. After pondering the possibilities for years and negotiating organizing agreements with multiple locals, it felt like a major achievement for Dahlhouse Scenery." Erik believes that there

are many benefits for the company and the employees with this new accomplishment, "not only because it helped to legitimize us within the industry, but also because we were able to bring many crew members in with us and to provide benefits to them as well as to others on our crew who were already union members." Dahlhouse has come a long way from the live/work loft space he was eating breakfast with his son in, to now being made up of 25 propmakers, set painters, construction laborers, drivers, an office staff of art department coordinators and a full time set designer in their spacious facility located in Boyle Heights. Dahlhouse has been serving the entertainment industry for over 19 years and have many more vears of memorable moments and milestones yet to come.

RE: Important news on new IATSE documents going into all start papers

Dear Brothers and Sisters:

This letter is to alert you to the fact that AMPTP and AICP employers will soon be adding to their start papers for all their productions a payroll deduction card for the IATSE PAC. A copy of these forms is enclosed. Employers have the option of distributing these forms by pdf, photocopy, or sending out the printed quadruplicate forms available from Mary Ann Kelly at IA headquarters. The most important thing is that workers promptly turn in completed forms to the payroll company. The quadruplicate forms include one copy for your local, making it likelier your members notify you they are donating (thereby making it easier for you to track who is contributing and who isn't; therefore, you may want to encourage employers and members to use those printed forms). More information about the payroll deduction process is available from our staff counsel Andrew Kahn in our West Coast Office.

Obviously hitting workers with another piece of paper soliciting donations is not likely by itself to generate much in the way of donations. Rather, it usually takes a visit or phone call from someone they know personally, such as their coworkers and officials at your local union. Thanks for impressing upon your members the importance of the upcoming Presidential and Senate elections in terms of who ends up on the NLRB, Supreme Court and other federal courts. Their rulings have a vital impact on jobs, wages, hours and working conditions.

Thank you for making a personal appeal to your members in the coming month, and let us know how we can better assist you in that process.
